Eastmoor High School opened its doors 4 September 1968

Wednesday, 4th September, 1968

Was a glorious late summer morning the string one Brilding received its first children & steff and became a school. The morning assembly began with a seading by a second year scholar forey Thompson, - a passage adapted from John Donne:

"No man is an island, completely on his cour; everyone is a part of the continent of mankind. If only one cloud of tarth in hashed away from the continent of tempe, Kenope is smaller; and if only one forson requires to play his field part in a community, the community is prover. When a short address by the Headwarte, the hymn "He bould our school on thee O fail was sung, and the shot of broship concended with prayers.

Min But it, the school secretary, the caretake, and Mr. W. I. Davis, Music & Prama Organis for the City, who presented the good wishes of the Anthority to the school. The morning was largely occupied with Kegistation, I instruction about general school nouline. During the course of the morning the school was Visited by Mr. R. Davies, Acting Director of Edu plad the first school neal to be prepared by Miss Youngman, cook sugarnior, and har staff, and in the afternoon the school settled down to normal timetable. At 3.35 p.m. the Fire Herm was sounded and the Fire Drill tested. The building was cleared in under two minutes in an orderly fashion. We are excited for next week and what this brings for them too!

What's new?

Lots! Too much to list here. But the main changes are:

- 1) Hygiene routines
- 2) Resource sharing
- 3) Arrival and departure routines
- 1) Students have been brilliant at washing their hands as they arrive on site each morning at one of the three washing stations. They have established great routines with regular cleaning/washing and sanitising as they move through school and at break and lunch. They've also shown a lot of maturity when learning (and adhering to) the new zones or 'bubbles' and the other measures put in place to be socially responsible.





2) Across the Academy, each student has been given an individual pack of resources that can either be left in their bubble or taken with them around school. This gives students some independence and some responsibility. Never a bad thing. Another



Covid 19 sensible benefit to this is it also means we are reducing the amount of things that are given to students on a daily basis. They have been fantastic at bringing their equipment to lesson and remaining organised. Long may it continue!

3) The arrival and departure of students has been excellent. They are arriving at their designated time and lessons have been starting promptly. Mostly, they have understood the importance of not grouping outside of school too.

Timings of the day Local Community

When students leave the Academy site, we strongly advise they go straight home and do not go to the shops in the local area or hang around the Terminus. Others need to use this area to get the bus and it is difficult to remain socially distant here. As well as this, elderly and vulnerable people make use of the pharmacy and we all need to be mindful of the wider community at this time.

If students must make use of the shops, they must follow the rules that the shop/s have put in place. For example, each shop at the Terminus has rules about how many people are allowed in the shops at any one time. They also observe social distancing rules. We must respect this and all of us have to wear a mask when inside the shop/s. Thank you in advance for reminding each other of these rules when off school site.
